



M&I AND AGRICULTURAL WATER SOURCES 2013






Figure 3-6 Wholesale Water Districts and Water Purveyors WCVC IRWM Region



More than 160 Total Water Purveyors


3 Wholesale Water Districts



WHAT IS IRWM?

- Collaborative effort to manage all aspects of water resources in a region
- Crosses jurisdictional, watershed, and political boundaries
- Involves multiple agencies, stakeholders, individuals, and groups
- Attempts to address issues and differing perspectives through mutually beneficial, integrated solutions

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




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IRWM PLAN GOALS

- Reduce dependence on imported water and protect, conserve and augment water supplies
- Protect and improve water quality
- Protect people, property and the environment from adverse flooding impacts
- Protect and restore habitat and ecosystems in watersheds
- Provide water-related recreational, public access, stewardship, engagement and educational opportunities
- Prepare for and adapt to climate change






WCVC IRWM PROGRAM ACHIEVEMENTS

- Local IRWM Program Established in 2004 Ventura County Boundaries
- 12 years of planning; 2 IRWM Plans developed
- Successful governance structure and collaboration Watershed Focus
- 37 Projects (Received 100% of what we applied for)
 - \$81 million in IRWM Implementation Grants (Prop. 50 and 84)
 - \$1.2 million in planning grants (Prop. 50 and 84)
 - \$150.3 million in local matching funds
 - \$231.3 million in total investments in IRWM projects
- Four focused studies funded by Planning Grants (Prop. 84)
 - Regional Groundwater Flow Model Update Phase 1
 - Biodigester Feasibility Study; Ventura River Watershed
 - Lower Santa Clara River Watershed Salt And Nutrient Management Plan
 - Las Posas Conjunctive Use Study, Phase 2

PROPOSITION 1

- Approved By Voters In 2014
- Multiple Funding Programs, Including IRWM
- Administered By Multiple State Entities
- Most Grants Require 50% Match
- IRWM Funding administered by Department of Water Resources
- \$810 Million For IRWM; \$98 Million For Our Funding Area (to be released in two rounds in 2018 and 2020)
- 20% earmarked for projects serving disadvantaged and underserved communities

- Participation in IRWM Watershed Committees
- Collaboration between WCVC and GSAs
- Ongoing regional planning IRWM Plan, County General Plan Update, Stormwater Resource Plan
- Ongoing local planning Urban Water Management Plans, recycled water plans, water master plans, city general plans
